Cascara Sagrada

Latin Name: Rhammus Purshiana

CLEANSING; Mild LAXATIVE (not considered habit forming)

Use AGED (at least 1 year), Dried BARK

Small tree Native to Northwest U.S., from Rocky Mountains to Pacific

HISTORY

- 1) 17th Century: Named 'Sacred Bark' by Spanish/Mexican explorers
- 2) Native Americans: CONSTIPATION; UPSET STOMACH
- 3) 1877 Eclectic Physicians: Habitual CONSTIPATION; Indigestion
- 4) German Commission E: CONSTIPATION

QUALITIES

- 1) NUTRIENTS: VITAMINS B1; B2; B5; B6; B9; B12; Choline
 - MINERALS: Calcium; Manganese; Potassium
 - OTHER: Bitter; Tannins; Hormone-like Oils (Promotes peristalsis)
- 2) CLEANSES and TONES COLON (Believed to Restore impaired bowel function over time)
- Chronic, Sluggish CONSTIPATION; Incites Peristaltic actions; GAS
- HEMORRHOIDS (Soft stool)
- Expels PARASITES; WORMS
- 3) Increase Flow of SECRETIONS: Stomach (also tones); Liver (Bile); Pancreas
- GALL BLADDER DUCTS; Gallstones
- 4) OTHER
- -INIVIGORATES and TONES body
- Soothes NERVES: Promotes SLEEP
